DRAFT MINUTES SPECIAL MEETING OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS PORT OF BROOKINGS HARBOR DISTRICT

Monday, April 4, 2022

This is not an exact transcript. The audio of the session is available on the Port's website.

The Port of Brookings Harbor District met in special session on the above date at 10:00am. Open session at the Port Conference Room, 16350 Lower Harbor Road Suite 202, Harbor OR, 97415, teleconference and webinar.

1. CALL MEETING TO ORDER

Commission President Richard Heap called the Special Meeting of the Port of Brookings Harbor of Commissioners to order at 10:00am.

• Commissioners Present:

Joseph Speir, Vice-President (Pos. #1); Sharon Hartung Secretary/Treasurer (Pos. #2); Larry Jonas (Pos. #3); Richard Heap, President (Pos. #4); and Kenneth Range (Pos. #5).

Gary Dehlinger, Port Manager; Travis Webster, Harbormaster; Danielle King, Safety/Administrative; Jack Akin, Port Engineer; and James Walker, Port Counsel.

- There were no changes to the agenda.
 - a. Commissioner Range did request that for the minutes in the Action Item be recorded in their entirety.
- There were no declarations of potential conflicts of interest.

2. APPROVAL OF AGENDA – Audio time 1:40

A motion was made by Speir and seconded by Jonas to approve the agenda as written. The motion passed 5 - 0.

3. PUBLIC COMMENTS - Audio time 2:04

There were two public comments. Yelena Nowak, Executive Director for the Oregon Trawl Commission who asked for the Boards consideration regarding the byproduct treatment plant and expressed the need and want for the treatment plant to help and continue to support our local fisherman and economic development. Gary Klein expressed his support for the commercial fisherman and byproduct treatment plant for our local fishermen and questioned the Board regarding Resolution 2021-03.

4. ACTION ITEMS

A. Byproduct Treatment Plant – Audio time 9:30

Commissioner Range: Do you want discussion first or a motion than discussion.

Commissioner Heap: If you prefer to make a motion to do it that's fine.

A motion was made by Range to approve first key elements of a business plan for a wastewater treatment plant for fish products in the Port of Brookings Harbor agreement we need 1. An agreement with Pac Seafood to lease a wastewater treatment plant built to their needs and present it to DEQ for a permanent NPDES permit, they have filed for one. Pacific Seafoods has requested that permit and then pulled it to see what was happening here and I haven't heard whether they have reactivated that request or if we would have to file under the Port or (inaudible). The Port or Pacific Seafood needs an agreement with Harbor Water to supply water, there is absolutely no reason to build the fish processing plant if you do not have water. They use, from what I understand, is 350,000 gallons a day during peak processing, Brett

is here and can answer any other questions regarding the water. Once there is a water agreement in place, Pacific Seafood, in my mind, needs to have cash on the table for us to build the plant and them, they decide that if it's not feasible or they got a better opportunity to go somewhere else or they want to go out of business. I don't agree with building a plant without a commitment by them. My idea of a commitment would be Pacific Seafood pays the 20% matched for the grant, provides all the costs for labor, insurance, electrical and any other costs related to the operation of the wastewater treatment plant. Pacific Seafood would negotiate a long-term lease with the Port attorney and staff to compensate over the period of the lease their investment of the 20% matched. A condition of the NPDES permit, which is, I'll give you the definition of that permit, if I can find it, is a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permit. So, one of the conditions of that permit is number 1, talking to DEQ it takes anywhere from 6 months on to get the permanent permit and one of the conditions of that is you have to submit your design information all the processing equipment and it be certified by DEQ, so in our case we would want both the Port and DEQ signing off.

Commissioner Heap: Why don't you go ahead with your motion and then you can explain it after you're done.

Commissioner Range: Okay.

Commissioner Speir: Do you want the motion now or wait until we discuss it.

Commissioner Heap: We are in a motion now.

Commissioner Range: That is the end of the motion. One more thing, I'm sorry, another condition of the NPDES permit will be there is no discharge of the wastewater treatment plant into the Chetco River, it dumps into the Pacific Ocean, that's it.

Commissioner Heap: Okay did anyone capture all that.

Someone from the audience started to speak.

Commissioner Heap: Excuse me ma'am, hold it down please, we will talk about it later.

Commissioner Heap: Alright, are we clear, what we are proposing here, what I believe is that Commissioner Range wants to make a motion that contains those elements is anyone clear enough to second that.

Commissioner Speir: Nope not me, I understand part of it, but I want to hear the whole thing over.

Commissioner Jonas: So, do I.

Commissioner Heap: Let me make a proposal, I see an issue here per notice. If we are going to make a significant action on this, we should probably properly notice it, so we know what exactly is included. My suggestion would be if we want to hear the motion, and no one wants to second this, the motion dies, if someone wants to second it, we can then sit down and capture that and put it on the next agenda for our next regular meeting so we have a chance to all see the support material and think about it and then take action than instead of trying to do it now. So, at this point if we have the conceptional motion I guess we would call from Ken who could fill out the details, if necessary, if we are going to move forward, for now we are looking for a second.

Commissioner Range: Do you want me to clarify the motion a little bit?

Commissioner Heap: Go ahead.

Commissioner Range: there is basically five elements, one an agreement with Pac Seafood to lease a wastewater treatment plant built to their needs and present it to DEQ for permeant NPDES permit. At the same time the Port

or Pacific Seafood needs a written agreement with Harbor Water to supply water to the waste treatment plant. Three is Pac Seafood pays 20% match for the grant provides our cost and the operation of the wastewater treatment plant. In consideration of that 20% match Pacific Seafood will negotiate a long-term lease for the wastewater treatment plant with the Port attorney and Staff.

King: I do have Tony Dal Ponte who is willing to speak on behalf of Pacific Seafood if you would like for him to come in at any time.

Commissioner Heap: well, let's see were go here with this motion before we get further sidetracked, thank you Danielle. So, I understand the gist of the motion or parts. And if we second the motion than we will have further discussion, but it would be my proposal if we have this motion made and we pass it, we don't take action on it today we take it forward to the next meeting with a full briefing and full support material packet than vote on it.

Commissioner Jonas: I agree with what you just said.

Commissioner Heap: Okay, we are looking for a second.

Commissioner Jonas: I'll second you.

Commissioner Heap: No, don't second me, second the motion, and we will go proceed from there Larry.

Commissioner Jonas: No.

Commissioner Speir: (inaudible) we should discuss it before we make any motions.

Commissioner Jonas: I agree.

Commissioner Speir: No for me, I'm not.

Commissioner Heap: Alright, appears the motion failed for a lack of second. Ill open it back up.

Commissioner Jonas: Id like to see what Ken wrote in writing, in front of me and be able to study it, research it, and any supporting material that goes along with it so I can read it, understand it, research it, talk to Ken if I need to and then move forward from there, that's what I would like to do.

Commissioner Hartung: okay, well there has been a lot of talking about why the seafood waste can't go to, why it isn't going to the City of Brookings, and there is a lot of reasons for that happening that I have looked into. One is the EPA has released reasoning for that is that that it could be harmful to the municipal sewer plant, because the plants is not designed to take fish waste, it could it could could make health risks to the treatment plant and the collection system to be exposed to these pollutants, so that's very concerning and for reasons for them not being able to release their waste water they way they do right now they have a special permit that they are putting in our basin over here and a lot of the fisherman have of this stuff hanging around their boat and it's not pleasant and its really is very harmful to our marine life out there as well, it takes all the oxygen away from them that I have looked into and you have these dead zones. Well, our dead zone is out in our estuary you know our sea life is struggling because of these things so these things have to be corrected and in order to keep our jobs here for our people and being able to have a processing plant here something has to be done and, but we need to do it in a way that it is acceptable for everybody. I understand, you know, we have people living here that they don't want to see a big wastewater treatment plant, I don't either. And I do believe that there are units that are more acceptable the footprint wouldn't have to be as large and it wouldn't be something that looked bad and because we have tourist that come here, this is a tourist destinations, our businesses rely on the tourist here and then of course we have our people that live in the community that like to enjoy the Port as well. So Pacific Seafood they've built a new plant in Warrenton, and they also put in a very state of the art fish processing plant, I don't believe that the footprint is as big as the one that we have been looking into I don't know if we have reached out to them because now, they are now also releasing their clean water from there back into the

Columbia River. So, it says here that it is first of its kind technology for clean wastewater and it is also conserving water, so evidently, they have really acquired something that works really well in the community. So, we would like in the future to offer an area so that we can have other economic development with other processer to come to the area, we have a lot of young people that need good paying jobs, and these jobs do pay well. And I believe that the Warrenton Plant is so much larger than this plant that maybe their system would also be able to accommodate future use. So, I'm hoping that maybe we could reach out to them to see what they what they have done here in Oregon. That's all I have, thank you.

Commissioner Heap: That might set the stage for Pacific Seafood to comment.

Commissioner Hartung: I couldn't find any pictures.

Tony Dal Ponte: Vice President of Legal and Public Affairs for Pacific Seafood, (inaudible) hear all those issues in your discussion.

Commissioner Heap: Please go ahead.

Dal Ponte: Thank you mister President and thank you members of the commission. First let's ground ourselves for what we are trying to accomplish here and thank you for forward thinking (inaudible) I don't know if you know this, but you are a coast wide leader, and your model is being followed now by other Ports. For context as you all are well aware BC Fisheries a few years ago built a processing plant on Port property and operated there under (inaudible) the Port. When BC Fisheries then went bankrupt a few years ago, Pacific Seafood agreed that the, with permission of course, to step in and operate. The major hurdle or impediment at the time had to do with wastewater discharge. The reason being that BC Fisheries was never properly permitted by Department of Environmental Quality. Someone early made a reference to it NPDES permit, that's the permit that's required to discharge related to wastewater (inaudible) from seafood processing. DEQ operates under delegated authority from the EPA, it never issued a permit to BC Fisheries so that created a problem. If Pacific Seafood were to step in and operate, we take our regulatory responsibility very very seriously, we need to have some relevant legal authority or permit in order to operate, DEQ is not able to do that. One of the options that we explored; well could we potentially reroute discharge to the City of Brookings. As someone else noted for a variety of reasons that's not possible, mostly due to the lack of capacity infrastructure at the city level they can't take the discharge, that facility and even if they could its not designed for treatment of that kind of discharge, its designed for a more traditional waste product than opposed to fish byproducts. So, now we find ourselves in the same situation that we were in a few years ago, which was in order to remain processing we need to have regulatory authority to do that. (inaudible) analyst has been conducted of the harbor in the area where the current outfall discharges and determined there is adequate solution, they call it, to permit discharge into that area. However, given changes in the regulatory landscape over the last 10 to 20 years or so, in order to meet those limits, a treatment system is required, additional treatment. What type of treatment that kind of depends on the discharge and the nature, a likely candidate would be something called a DAF, dissolved aerial floatation, it uses little, tiny bubbles to take solubilize protein, which is what we are talking about here. The waste is extra protein that was in the ocean to begin with, that dissolves into the water, and it discharges back out into the ocean. It uses tiny micro bubbles the raise those proteins to the surface than it skims it off the top. That could be installed (inaudible) installed in some cases at the individual facility, they call it an end of the line treatment. The refences (inaudible) the design in Warrenton is a variation of that it is proprietary technology out of Europe, but rather than using chemicals to bond to the protein that are in the water that help raise them to the surface, that uses something called symmetrical force as opposed to chemical. Now, that particular design, the dan tech system, is not designed for shrimp or crab product, it's a unique protein, highly soluble they break down a lot faster than ground fish or (inaudible) which is what is produced in Warrenton. Fortunately, you the commissioners of the Port of Brookings, this is where I want to thank you because you have a very forward thinking innovative approach to this and were successful in it for the first time in my knowledge in securing funding by the Federal Government to a local government to develop infrastructure that supports Port owned infrastructure in the economic, in one of the most major economic engines in the region. We lease the facility that we operate in currently from the Port, the Federal Government is now offering to fund treatment by the Port that results from that operation. The cool part about it is in funding that is not necessarily limited short term to this one processing plant, it could be there

are other interests in the market and the Port might invest in this infrastructure is supporting that kind of (inaudible) forward thinking innovated approach was incredibly creative and I just wanted to thank you on behalf of Pacific Seafood for that leadership for that innovated effort. Your model is now being followed by the Port of Coos Bay who is attempting to do exactly the same thing in Charleston, and I suspect there will be others because given the changes in the regulatory landscape it frankly isn't possible for individual companies to invest at this scale at this facility. To have a place like Charleston or Coos Bay you can't (inaudible) four different million-dollar treatment plant but if the Port rallies together and develops Port infrastructure that than operates through the convenance or partnership with the economic producers in the region than you're supporting that activity. So, you guys developing this model for your footprint were really forward thinking and we very much appreciate that effort and we are here to support that effort. I know there are some final details to work through in terms of what specifically is constructed, the work the engineer that develop one model (inaudible) DEQ I'm sure the DEQ engineers will develop or have thoughts. What the operating model, there will of course be issues of figuring out how that works. One of the strings on the Federal Government funds was that this is a Port owned and Port operated facility to support jobs, but obviously it is there to support the activity at the Port processing facility that we are operating so there will probably be a usage or treatment fee of some kind. There is a matching dollar center that we need to work through, that can be structured a number of different ways, whether collect payment or something that was built over time or something that any new interest in the space that want to take advantage of the Port infrastructure (inaudible) all of those are questions we can work though. The good news is that 3.5 million dollars doesn't come around just every day the Federal Government investing in rural coastal communities and supporting a very very important industry (inaudible). I know there are other business owners in the room (inaudible) that all have roots and (inaudible) investment in that region. It's a cool opportunity very very impressive investment by the Federal Government and incredible example of forward thinking by the Port. We are here to help dig through these final details and thank you for your leadership thus far.

Commissioner Heap: Thank you very much, appreciate your comments.

Commissioner Range: I have a question for Tony.

Commissioner Heap: Go ahead.

Commissioner Range: Tony, Ken Range, is Pacific Seafood willing to enter into a long-term lease before this permit is issued by NPDS and we have to pay the 20% match, obviously it would be conditional on all sorts of things that we have to discuss, but I need to know if Pacific Seafood will make a financial agreement.

Tony Dal Ponte: we already have, we just executed a 60-year lease to operate the processing plant. We aren't able to operate that plant without treatment, and we wont because its would be unlawful to do so. So, if this is the solution to treat the discharge associated with that economic activity than yes that would be a necessary part of that, there already is a 60-year lease, some kind of operating agreement for the treatment facility would be appropriate and we can work that out.

Commissioner Range: I'm not sure if I followed all that, but the question, the concern that I have is we are doing we are going to borrowing money to do 20% match on 2 FEMA projects now we are talking about another 20% match for a water treatment plant that you are the primary for the only user or beneficiary of this treatment plant I don't want I will not vote for proceeding with a wastewater treatment plant if you guys don't have a financial stake in it with a long term lease.

Commissioner Heap: Okay.

Tony Dal Ponte: Understood, I'm simply referring to the fact there already is an existing lease and a financial (inaudible) in it. If the Port were to decide to borrow money on the 20% match which is one of the serious (inaudible) if the Port did that than yes it would be appropriate to have some kind of operating agreement to do that. Another option would be to ask for a private contribution up front to fund some portion of it. We could also amend the existing lease for the Port facility to incorporate some aspect of match for this 3.5 million investment

by the Federal Government. I think there are a variety of ways to address your concerns and we are happy to talk about those.

Commissioner Heap: Thank you, further comments.

Commissioner Range: I have a response to one of Sharon's concerns. You know the primary agencies involved in this whole process would be obviously Harbor Water, Harbor San, Brookings, and DEQ and Pacific Seafood. Right now, Pacific, excuse me, Harbor San has a collection permit from DEQ for sewage, they in turn pump that sewage to Brookings to be processed in the sewage treatment plant. Harbor San pays the City of Brookings roughly 30% of what it cost to operate the sewage treatment plant. There would be no reason for us to treat water, treat fish waste, pump that processed fish byproduct that could be put directly into the ocean with a permit. It would be, there is no reason to pump it to Harbor San and then they in turn pump it to Brookings when its already treated water. I don't know if that answers your question or not.

Commissioner Heap: I have several comments to make, not surprisingly right. First of all, I am not going to be very comfortable to enter into an agreement were there are other parties paying for this facility. And my rationale of this is that this needs to be wholly publicly owned, so that we are clear in the future that should some other entity chose to come in and ask to us to use this facility we don't have all kinds of dangling strings where we have to have agreements among multiple parties, this to me should be public facility from day one. With respect to having an agreement or contract between Harbor Water and the Port and processing plant I'd be interested in the Port not to be in that equation, that's a discussion between the people who buy the water and sell the water, all we are doing here is processing the water we have no interface beyond that from my prospective. We don't intend to use much water to do this, very little water will actually be required to do the processing, so I would not be to inclined to want to do something like that. And having it been stated many times, the concern we've taken forward from the beginning is we are operating under the premise of the Port of Brookings Harbor will be a working Port, this is a working Port, so we have fishing activities here for recreational commercial and it is in the best interest of the community to continue to support that for a multitude of reasons, economic benefits, jobs, you can name it all those what you want. In order to pursue that, in order to look down the long term the idea of the waste treatment plant give the Port of Brookings Harbor an advantage, it give the commercial fishing industry that (inaudible) here an advantage, a competitive advantage over other ports, and the reason that that's true is because we today we do not even know what the fishery will be in 10 years, I can tell you things are changing in the ocean and they are changing fast, faster than we can keep up with, we are seeing species movement like we have never seen before we have southern species showing up here. One of the largest fisheries in Oregon over the last few years have been market squid, market squid didn't exist here in any number before, at least not economically viable numbers and now they do. Fourth largest? Do you know? Fourth largest fisheries now.

Yelena Nowak: Brookings?

Commissioner Heap: No, market squid.

Yelena Nowak: Oh squid, Im not sure, I don't think it's still a commercial fishery, I think they are still working on it.

Brett Hester: Yeah, they are just now working on it, (inaudible) it's so new there are no regulations.

Commissioner Heap: Okay, but the point is that there are maybe a multitude, multiple number of uses for this plant that we haven't even anticipated yet, but having it here again, gives us an advantage, gives our commercial fleet an advantage, that's an advantage to the community. So, I think that's the, well I don't think that's the catalyst that got us to this point right now and the discussions we've had over and over again before we started down the road of asking for funding. I think that Tony made a great point, there has not been many federal funded projects like this to support fisheries and as we move forward that's going to become an issue, the ability for this country to process protein and make seafood or out of seafood is going to be significant. I just came back from Washington DC where we had a long discussion about aquaculture, aquaculture is one of the initiatives of the government along with wave energy and wind energy for uses of the ocean. You know we are thinking

aquaculture net pens there is a whole new (inaudible) of aquaculture opportunities out there and they very well may be what we do in the future for protein and seafood in this county, irrespective of that we are going to have to process that stuff some place, and again if we have the waste treatment plant here that puts us in a huge advantage, economically and competitively. So, we don't have a motion, where are we going to go from here.

Commissioner Hartung: I don't think that, in my opinion, I don't think we are ready to make a motion on this project.

Commissioner Heap: Well what point do you think we will be? We have an engineered design.

Commissioner Hartung: We haven't really heard everything yet either, I know we have a design Richard, but the thing is the design is huge and I don't think that it looks very well for our community, and I believe there are other systems out there that could accommodate our use that could be enclosed totally and wouldn't be visible to the public and it would fit the cosmetic landscape of our Port.

Commissioner Speir: I agree with her, I'd like to see what Warrenton has.

Commissioner Hartung: Jack, is that true?

Commissioner Speir: I'm not into a big old.

Commissioner Hartung: Is that so?

Jack Akin: Should I speak?

Commissioner Heap: why don't you go ahead Jack.

Akin: You're afraid I'm going to keep going.

Commissioner Heap: No no, what I'm afraid of is that this has been asked and answered many many times but go ahead.

Commissioner Hartung: Well, I haven't heard it.

Akin: Is there a mic?

Multiple people: No.

Akin: Good morning, as a fly on the wall I'd have to say I admire the conversations going on here right now. The design that I put forth is conceptual in a sense that we have not looked, and we plan on doing it, in fact we have a meeting later on today with Pac Choice representative to more closely look at the parameters of consent. The units that I've shown you and there actually we have another PowerPoint that we put on top of the previous PowerPoint that kind of says the same thing but in more detail as the previous PowerPoint, shows these modest units. The largest of these kinds of these the element of these units are tanks, and these tanks are sized based off the assumption of the worst-case scenarios. The more I'm learning about the specify of this particular wastewater the smaller this system is becoming. You might have heard Tony mention S.A.F, S.A.F is the fine bubble air ration for floatation purposes. Uses air to float material. This is the kind of approach that is generally acceptable in terms of this kind of waste, that's included in this system. But any system you look at I don't care where you go, what kind of system you are looking for they have to have some sort of (inaudible) separators, separating inorganic material from organic. Inorganic cannot be treated, all that can be done is separated. Organic material, its usually about the weight of water, is treated biologically some way or another so it can be reduced to zero as close to zero sludge as you can possibly get, that's the objective. The other elements that are involved here depend on that waste that waste is specific Pac Choice waste here is specific, it may seem like everyone else's, but it is specific to this Port and the treatment is going to be the safe. I'll give you an example, you know a

clarifier, if you've ever talk to a wastewater treatment plant person, has been in the business for 40 years or so on. And you ask what the clarifier looks like, they're going to tell you its this big circular thing that's 50 feet in diameter, at least, and has a large rotating arm and its slowly moves very slow, anybody ever see one of these clarifiers. Okay. Our clarifier is a packed unit, it uses multi laminar layers, it's just a packed unit, its smaller than between these two tables. It's a whole different idea that our ray of systems then are going to modified based on what we find that wastewater treatment needs. There are other questions about where the effluent should go, whether it should go out to the ocean or the Chetco river or wherever it will go but remember we are under serious regulatory constraints. We have to do mixing zone calculations; we can't have this big footprint of waste coming out of here out of our effluent we are going to be really tightly constraint by the DEQ on this. They are going to want to see predesign, they are going to see exactly how big is the area, I'm going to use the standard com model that accepts multi-layer stuff for the worst-case scenario for mixing zone. So, irrespective of whatever wastewater or whatever person is able to sell us whatever system units they want, I want something that I have a track record. The reason why I committed this one is because I've been studying this for 20 years since 2000 when I went to Israel for the first system that came out. Okay. These kind of systems are universal process is universal the method and solution is universal. You've got to do the same thing. Like learning math, you have to start here and work your way up, same with wastewater treatment. You can find new ideas but you're still solving the same problem, so the idea is compaction and making the smallest model we can. And I can tell you as your engineer I have nothing to gain from this, I do not get any commission from any system that I recommend, it's a conflict of interest for me to take a dollar from anyone besides other than the Port of Brookings on my work, so, I want you to know that I'm always seeking your guys best interest on this, I hope to better understand wastewater for our next meeting and we will be able to, I think, combine our system. the biggest footprint is equalization to make the system, so I don't have to worry about peaks, so with that does that help at all. Clarify anything? Ask me a question if you'd like.

Commissioner Hartung: I don't know where to start Jack.

Akin: It's complex.

Commissioner Hartung: I know it is its very complex and you know what and I know it is very needed here the thing is is to do the right one, you know, and a great big, we don't want a great, the community doesn't want a great big sewer plant we want a fish wastewater treatment plant.

Akin: Have you looked the one I've showed, their small units.

Commissioner Hartung: I know but mister Dehlinger has said in the past that the unit you have shown us in the past can also do human waste, and I don't want us to do that.

Akin: You would have to add a lot to it for that to happen.

Commissioner Hartung: Well, that's good, but anyway I'd just like to see a smaller footprint then that great big unit you showed us from what Minnesota was it, or somewhere, (inaudible)

Akin: That's the water biological reduction, and that highly dependent on the type of you know the needs of the waste, you heard again Tony mention S.A.F that, very good chance that will do most of our work. We still probably have some grit separation, we still have to have some clarification, even for a small unit.

Commissioner Hartung: because of particles.

Akin: But the biological reduction which is what we want when we want stuff going out to the ocean, we don't want to send a lot of protein and a lot of stuff out there.

Commissioner Hartung: I don't mean to sound redundant because I know we have had a lot of meets and because of our communication with the newspaper with the public has not existed really here anymore and so the public hasn't been informed because there hasn't really been away for them to be informed because a lot of them don't

take the time to look at our website so of course they don't know. So anyways there has been a lot of concern from the public and they just don't want something that.

Commissioner Speir: Gaudy.

Commissioner Hartung: Yeah that it's not going to look well for the community and the people that have homes here, I mean we don't want to devalue their property because of this, and so I'm just hoping that when you come back that you let us know if it will be an enclosed system where it wont be out in the open and you know really the size.

Commissioner Heap: Well as I understand the process now there's going to be several more touch points before we have a plant on the ground. One of which will be approving the engineering design and style, which it will be up to us to approve that. We are going to have to select, I mean I don't know that we are going to select whether or not they accept the money, I mean I think that's a done deal but ill leave it up to you to tell us what the touch points are going to be.

Dehlinger: There will be a contact coming to the board to approve from whatever agency that is going to fund the money, so there will be a contract, like you were saying we are going to have a design that Jack is going to present that the board has to approve that, there will be a lot of approvals going on and plus we are meeting with DEQ later this week about permitting they say it could take 6 months to one year to complete depending on the type of plant.

Akin: Normally if you come to DEQ with, remember we haven't been thinking about this starting yesterday, so we have a lot of stuff laid down with these guys, they're not so concerned about the past except for fee as much as processing. And another thing that is important to them is the mixing zone, and everyone probably in this room is concerned about the mixing zone, and when I say that I mean what comes out of that pipe and goes into where and how does it affect anything, that's really what the (inaudible) of this permit process and so that is where we are most able and qualified to get to the point and answer, and I think that going to help us shorten our permitting period, which is my objective.

Commissioner Range: So, Jack I have a question, is the Port requesting the permit from DEQ or is Pacific Seafood, they have already requested one, and to my knowledge they withdrawn that request depending on what we do.

Akin: No, it's the Port that is going to submit the permits.

Commissioner Range: So Pacific Seafood would enter in on our permit.

Akin: Pacific Seafood is so very important as far as process that the end of the road is I don't think anybody on the regulatory side easily, okay I can't say that, but I can say on the money side and probably the Ports best interest as an engineer, I would not recommend anyone but the Port completely having control and owning the wastewater treatment plant.

Commissioner Range: But obviously Pacific Seafood whatever equipment you buy, which we haven't even discussed the cost of any of this equipment because we have no business plan that I've seen, but they have to well they have to come in on our permit, that's.

Commissioner Heap: Bottom line is the Port will have the permit and then we will enter into an agreement with whoever uses the waste treatment plant.

Akin: And you have distinction that's common you can do it however you want you have owners, and you have operators. So that's kinda the way it works.

Commissioner Heap: Thanks Jack. Before we take any more comments, we will we hear from the Board.

Commissioner Hartung: Do you have anything Larry?

Commissioner Jonas: No

Commissioner Heap: So just to kinda resolve about what we think we talked about today. We have a Commissioner Range expressed his desire for what we might want going forward with some conditions. So, we have a check point coming on several different issues before this plant hits the ground. So, we have gone beyond the idea of a conception here. We have past that we've secured funding from the Federal Government through appropriation, we have the engineer already on task to design the plant for us and as we move forward then we will have more check-ins where we have an opportunity to weigh in. I will tell you about the visual side of this, I'm a little concerned that we are going to have some sort of an expectation that there isn't going to be anything here. We have no visual standard for this Port that says other than our retail buildings that are designed to a certain specification that best of my knowledge the county has no visual standards requirements for us to meet. So, we are going to have to do the best we can to make this as compact and unintrusive as possible, however, they're going to build a plant. So, you know I think everybody clearly understands we are going to have a small footprint as we can but that doesn't mean it isn't not going to be visible.

Commissioner Hartung: Well of course, it's probably going to be visible.

Commissioner Heap: That doesn't mean, you know, that when we go forward with dredging its not going to be a big field out there full of dredge spoils or that sort of thing. But we're a good neighbor too, we're not interested in (inaudible) but again like a I said we are a working Port, and we are going to have to do the best we can to put all that together. So, any other comments or questions. Are we clear on where we are headed now?

Commissioner Speir: Somewhat, yeah.

Commissioner Heap: Well, (inaudible) your comments Joe (inaudible)

Commissioner Speir: I don't have anything to say quite yet if I decide to, I'll decide to.

Commissioner Heap: Okay. Alright. One each, go ahead Dan.

Dan Fraser: My comment is regarding between Sharon and Jack's. Sharon talking about dead zones in the harbor and that the discharge and the mixing zones are (inaudible) Jack, what kinda temperature are we talking that's coming off of this water, do we know Jack?

Akin: You're probably not going to have too much of an increase, there's a slight increase in temperature due to the defuser the air that fuses, but you're going to have not much of a change in terms of degrees, that's highly, that part of the permitting process, to make sure that we don't deliver any, you know, warm water into the Port, in the water.

Commissioner Heap: I'd like to just clarify one thing, I'm not aware of dead zones here. We have in the past had algae blooms and killed a lot of anchovies, we have had a high concentration of algae and anchovies in here at the same time but as part of (inaudible) to collect a lot of data out here I'm not aware of any dead zones.

Commissioner Hartung: Well

Commissioner Heap: I'm not aware we have killed any salmon I'm not aware that we have had major impacts in the harbor other than those anchovies' concentrations, so I don't know if id characterize this as they did though. I mean we have huge tidal surge, we are like a lot of estuaries, we have, we are short, we don't have you know a 40-mile-long estuary, we have issues we've got a lot of tide moving in and out we have a lot of water moving in and out. So, I haven't seen, nor have I heard a concern expressed by either the National Marine Fisheries Service or the State of Oregon about having a dead zone being created here. Now temperature is an issue that this, I

mean, Chetco river does not meet standards has never met standards in temperature and that has a lot more to do with the geography of the kalmiopsis wilderness and (inaudible) that were is meets up and it brings it right down here so for the perspective of (inaudible) we don't meet standards and the river never has and the other thing that is an eliminating factor for salmon in this harbor is the lack of estuary, we don't have a big enough estuary to meet the state standards. Other than that, I'm not aware of any other problems of discharge or not that's been created, okay. We have a comment or question.

Audience Member: Stand up and come on.

Commissioner Heap: If you wouldn't mind, please.

Sandy Gertrude Brown: Good morning, I'm Sandy Gertrude Brown I'm a board member of Seacliff Terrace, which is right across the river, I certainly don't represent our community, but I think some one my comments might be shared by the many members of Seacliff Terrace that are here. Firstly, I'm very concerned about the lack of information given to the community, this is the first time I've heard about any of this, and it seems to be about half of a done deal already. We have so many questions we couldn't even begin but id strongly encourage exploring other locations, I appreciate Mrs. Hartung's work on getting inform on the Warrenton plant I think it is essential we get more information on that, we need to minimize the impact on fish and wildlife, this is the community is built around that, we also need to minimize the impact on nearby homes that are immediately across the river. We enjoy the Port activity but I'm not sure we would enjoy a large noisy eye sore probably with steam and things coming out of the top, I don't know, I don't know because we haven't been given no information there is just, to me there are a lot of blank pages here, we have no information we don't know what's going on and this is going to be a major impact to the whole Port not just us. As far as discharge into the ocean, where is it going to be the discharge, is it going to impact the beaches, the swimming, the water temperatures, I don't, we don't know, we don't have answers to many questions, so I think, and I would ask the commission provide much more information to the community. Thank you.

Commissioner Heap: Okay let's bring this to a close, so where we are going to be from this point forward is we will be going to the next check in period we are going to have whatever that might be whenever they come, so do you have any idea when, have you heard anything about when funding may come.

Dehlinger: In the packet they gave me a question and answer they said several months.

Commissioner Heap: Several months.

Dehlinger: I'm anticipating two to three months down the road we might see a contract.

Commissioner Heap: So, in the meantime the engineering firm will continue to move forward on the design ideas.

Dehlinger: Yeah.

Commissioner Heap: How about permitting?

Dehlinger: Same as that, we are, like I've said we have a meeting with DEQ later this week, we will see from there. I don't know what they want or what they are going to say. But you know on DEQ, Pacific Seafood they're trying to get a two-year extension on their temporary permit to discharge, so they can run this plant, right now they are shut down they aren't able to run the plant. If Tony is still on the line, he may be able to speak more on that.

Dal Ponte: Mister President I'd be happy to address that if you'd like.

Commissioner Heap: Go ahead.

Dal Ponte: Like I said earlier the plant was never properly permitted so we acted for two years under a temporary agreement with DEQ (inaudible) permit it in the future, that temporary agreement expired in December. Our proposal to the agency is to extend the agreement that (inaudible) any development of the treatment system that we know is necessary in order to meet the needs of the standards, DEQ is considering that proposal right now. But has yet to deliver a final answer, we hope to hear back from the agency (inaudible) we could have the certainty that we need (inaudible) to operate (inaudible) for the upcoming shrimp season.

Commissioner Heap: Okay, thank you. Alright with that I would propose a 5-minute recess we will take 5 minutes and we will come back and deal with the rest of the agenda.

Commissioner Heap adjourned into a 5-minute recess – Audio time 1:02:17

Commissioner Heap reconvened the meeting – Audio time 1:09:43

A motion was made by Speir and second by Jonas to approve draft C.J. Huntsman, CPA, P.C. Engagement Agreement for the fiscal year 2021-22 and authorize the Port Manager and Board President to sign the agreement. The motion passed 5-0.

M. Wastewater Treatment Plant Timeline and Design Progressing Approval — Audio time 1:20:13

Commissioner Heap reviewed with the Board the timeline of past events that brought the Port to this point and future events that will be happening for the wastewater treatment plant. The goal of the Board now is to look at the design options that meet the DEQ permitting requirements. Jack Akin, Port Engineer, spoke with the Board regarding the correspondence with Senator DeFazio's Office, there is a belief the Board does not want this wastewater treatment plant due to a news article, but we need to make it known that the Board does want the wastewater treatment plant on their facility. There was a discussion among Pacific Seafood Manager, Brett Hester, the Board, and Jack Akin regarding the DEQ permit that Pacific Seafood has been temporarily approved.

A motion was made by Jonas and seconded by Range to approve EMC Engineers/Scientists to proceed with design options to meet regulatory requirements for disposal of crustacean and fish processing only. The motion passed 5-0.

N. RV Park Septic Tank on Drawing Clarification - Audio time 1:49:01

Commissioner Heap reviewed that this is a clarification on the previous conceptual drawing from the April 4, 2022, workshop meeting. Commissioner Heap confirmed with Jack Akin, Port Engineer, the RV Park will be built on the Kite Field from the FEMA project will not use a septic system but will be hooked up to Harbor Sanitary sewer system.

A motion was made by Range and seconded by Speir to approve the sewer system design in the RV Park expansion to be connected to Harbor Sanitary District system. The motion passed 5-0.

O. Commissioner and Staff Relations – Audio time 1:55:00

Commissioner Heap noted that there may be some communication issues among the Board and the Port Manager. SDAO has given the Board some training but recommends asking to bring down George Dunkel to talk about the real-world experiences, clarification on what lines to not cross, and clarification on the line of policy and operations.

A motion was made by Heap to approve him to contact SDAO and have George Dunkel come down to here to give us the opportunity to ask questions and clarify what our concerns are.

Commissioner Heap asked James Walker, Port Counsel, about having an executive session with the Commissioners, SDAO, and Port Manager to talk about communication issues and roles and responsibilities. Walker clarified the laws for having an executive session and training session, recommended a special session instead of executive session.

A motion was made by Heap and second by Jonas to approve the Board directing the President to contact SDAO, seeking the services of George Dunkel or somebody in that field to come down here and have a special meeting, workshop, to discuss the roles of the commissioners, the roles of the Port Manager to clarify those and make sure everyone is clear on that, talk about communications between Board

members, and between Board members and the Port Manager, clarify that and answer questions we may have about open meeting laws that sort of thing, as soon as possible. The motion passed 5-0.

Commissioner Heap noted Dehlinger has spoken with Visitors Association to have a uniform sign, the Board has some examples in front of them, and suggested to the Board to have this item as an action item in the future to clarify some details. The Board had a concern regarding this sign and Tidewind Sportfishing Lease Contract and want clarification this sign is not in violation of that agreement.

Commissioner Heap reviewed the letters from Mike Crow and McLennan Contracting regarding not starting the RV Park project when projected and additional fees due to trenching and adding conduit.

Webster wanted the Board and public to be aware that at the South Jetty, North end, there is a very shallow spot to be careful of.

 Commissioner Heap reviewed the issues that were exposed during the renovation of the new non-moorage charter and guide fish cleaning room. Webster gave more details regarding the renovations.

Safety

All Port Staff received CPR, First Aid & AED training by MedLife (formally CalOre Life Flight), certifications are good for (2) years.

Incidents

POBH recorded (10) incidents for the month of April bring the year total to (41). Incidents included:

- 1. Gear storage customer stated that pallets have been stolen from their storage area, this is the third year in a row this has happened. After looking at the video footage two vehicles pulled up to the gear storage area and loaded their vehicles up with roughly 25 pallets and left. Customer has reported the incident with Curry County Sheriffs.
- Two different RV Park guests at two different dates had a campfire going in their site, they decided to leave their site and campfire unattended. The winds knocked over a chair into the fire, catching the chair and surrounding grass on fire. RV Park Manager was able to put the fire out and contact the guests.
- 3. RV Park Manager witnessed an individual drive into dry camping, pull out a Home Depot bucket, dump its contents on the ground, and leave. The individual dumped food trash onto the ground.
- 4. Fishing Vessel Yaznak was leaving their slip on transient dock, when the vessel got stuck in gear and ran into an already questionable piling at the Hallmark fisheries dock. Staff was unable to determine the extent of the new damage, insurance was informed of the incident.
- 5. A white GMC was left on Port property, this vehicle did not have any license plates, did not have a Port parking permit and was tagged multiple times, vehicle was towed from Port property.
- 6. An RV had mechanical issues and parked in the commercial basin parking lot, 4 Aces Security kept in contact with them while the individuals were trying to fix it. After a few days/nights working on the RV they got it moving around 11PM but by the time they got to Fat Irish the RV caught fire. Curry County Sheriffs and Harbor Fire came down to extinguish the RV, sheriffs advised owner to move RV out of the roadway and into boat launch parking lot until it can be moved. The owner removed some items the next day, left Port property and haven't been seen since. Port staff had Wes's towing move the RV to a secure location to protect the individual's personal property and an abandonment notice has been placed on the RV.
- 7. Pacific Seafood old dock had a broken piling, not sure how it snapped, but it was not a structural piling. Port staff was able to remove half of the broken piling.
- 8. Port staff found a hypodermic needle in the light fixture in the commercial basin restroom, men's side. Needle was properly picked up and disposed of in the Port's hazardous waste container.

9. Port Staff was informed of an oil spill on N & O's main dock and ramp. After watching video footage, it looks like some buckets were brought up the dock and ramp, leaking on the way to the parking lot. Owner of the vessel and deck hand cleaned spill as best as possible and contacted Harbormaster the next day. Port staff looked at the spill and determined that additional clean up was not needed and since the oil did not enter the water, the national response center did not need to be contacted of the spill.

Security

Four Aces Security Solutions and POBH recorded (103) security issues. Issues included:

Environmental / DEO 1200-Z Industrial Stormwater

Monthly inspections were completed as required by our Stormwater Pollution Control Plan (SWPCP). Stormwater testing was completed during the recent storms. This was the second of four required tests this year.

The Prom Committee and 4 Aces Security were notified that parking tags will be suspended until midnight that night.

The request for additional funding for the wastewater treatment plant did not happen. If the Port needs additional funding, we will need to apply to other agencies for grants or loans. The Board approve moving forward with the wastewater treatment plant design with EMC Engineers/Scientists at the Regular Commissioner Meeting on April 20, 2022. We are anticipating having a preliminary WWTP drawing design in 60 days for board review.

Had a meeting with Oregon Department of Environmental Quality regarding the wastewater treatment plant permitting process. The Port will need to come up with a predesign system and submit the application before they can provide comments on our wastewater treatment plant. Time is of the essence to submit the predesign system.

EMC Engineers/Scientists and the Port continues preparing construction drawings and bid packages for the FEMA project. On April 18, EMC submitted the budget to FEMA for budget approval on the repairs and mitigation work. FEMA's review and approval could take 45 days or longer.

USDA Rural Development completed its civil rights compliance review and security inspection for the loan (\$2,000,000) the Port received in year 2000 to rebuild Basin 1. The report will be forthcoming.

- Port legal counsel reviewed and approved the small construction project contract for this
 project. This contract is a new form to the Port provided by Miller Nash.
- Port will need to apply and pay for the Joint Permit Application (JPA) for the in-water work.
- If approved, the Port will ask the contractor to purchase and deliver the steel pile prior to the construction to avoid any steel or delivery escalation costs.

PORT OF BROOKINGS HARBOR SMALL CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS CONTRACT

This Contract is between the Port of Brookings Harbor, an Oregon special district ("Port"), and Billeter Marine LLC, an Oregon limited liability company

Project: Basin 2 Pile Replacement

The parties agree as follows:

Date of Commencement and Substantial Completion. The date of commencement of the Work shall be October 15, 2022 or the date on which each party has signed this Contract, whichever is later.

The Contract Time shall be measured from the date of commencement. Contractor shall achieve Substantial Completion of the entire Work no later than March 15, 2023.

Contractor's Agreement to Perform Work. Contractor agrees to perform the Work described in Exhibit 2.

Statement of Work. Contractor shall perform the Work described in Exhibit 2.

Payment for Work. Port agrees to pay Contractor in accordance with Exhibit 2 and this Contract.

Contract Documents. The Contract Documents consist of the following documents, which are listed in descending order of precedence: this Contract; Owner's request for proposals, including but not limited to any plans and specifications (the "Solicitation"); and Contractor's quote dated March 22, 2022, excluding the terms under the headings "Notes" and "Payment Terms" on page 2.

A conflict in the Contract Documents shall be resolved in the priority listed above with this Contract taking precedence over all other documents. The Contract Documents are the entire Contract between the parties and shall supersede any prior representation, written or oral.

STANDARD TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- <u>Time is of the Essence</u>. Time is of the essence in the performance of this Contract
- 2. Subcontracts. Port reserves the right to reject in writing any proposed subcontractor, without cause, in which case Contractor shall promptly propose a substitute subcontractor. Any difference in price arising out of such substitution shall be reflected in a Change Order. In addition to any other provisions Port may require, Contractor shall require of any permitted subcontractor under this Contract that subcontractor be bound by all the same terms and conditions of this Contract. Such subcontracts are solely between Contractor and subcontractor and shall not have any binding effect on Port.
- Assignment. This Contract is not assignable by Contractor, either whole or in part, unless Contractor has obtained the prior written consent of Port.
- 4. Other Contractors. Port may undertake or award other contracts for additional or related work, and Contractor shall fully cooperate with such other contractors and with any Port employees concerned with such additional or related work, and shall coordinate its performance under this Contract with such additional or related work. Contractor shall not commit or permit any act that will interfere with the performance of work by any other contractor or by Port employees.
- Independent Contractor Status. Contractor shall certify status in accordance with Exhibit 4.
- 6. No Third-Party Beneficiaries. Port and Contractor are the only parties to this Contract and are the only parties entitled to enforce its terms. Nothing in this Contract gives or provides any benefit or right, whether directly, indirectly, or otherwise, to third persons unless such third persons are individually identified by name in this Contract and expressly described as intended beneficiaries of this Contract.
- Successors in Interest. The provisions of this Contract shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the parties and their successors and approved assigns, if any.
- 8. Nonperformance. In the event of nonperformance under this Contract, Port, after seven (7) days' written notice, shall have the right to obtain from other sources such services as may be required to accomplish the Work not performed, and it is agreed that the difference in cost, if any, for said Work or goods shall be borne by Contractor. For purposes of this section, nonperformance shall be defined as failure to appear and perform Work as specified and scheduled.
- 1 Small Construction Projects Contract

- 9. Early Termination. This Contract may be terminated as follows:
 - a. <u>Termination by Mutual Agreement</u>: Port and Contractor, by mutual written agreement, may terminate this Contract at any time.
 - Termination for Convenience: Port in its sole discretion may terminate this Contract for any reason on 30 days' written notice to Contractor.
 - c. <u>Termination for Breach</u>: Either Port or Contractor may terminate this Contract in the event of a breach of the Contract by the other. Prior to such termination, the party seeking termination shall give to the other party written notice of the breach and intent to terminate. If the party committing the breach has not entirely cured the breach within 15 days of the date of the notice, then the party giving the notice may terminate the Contract at any time thereafter by giving a written notice of termination. If Port's termination for breach is determined later to have been wrongful or without justification, then the termination will be considered to have been a termination for convenience.
 - d. <u>Termination for Failure to Maintain Qualifications</u>: Notwithstanding Section 9(c),Port may terminate this Contract immediately by written notice to Contractor upon denial, suspension, revocation, or non-renewal of any license, permit, or certificate that Contractor must hold to provide services under this Contract.
 - e. <u>Payment on Early Termination</u>: Upon termination pursuant to Section 9, payment shall be made as follows:
 - i. If terminated under 9(a) or 9(b) for the convenience of Port, Port shall pay Contractor for Work performed prior to the termination date if such Work was performed in accordance with the Contract. Port shall not be liable for direct, indirect, or consequential damages. Termination shall not result in a waiver of any other claim that Port may have against Contractor.
 - If terminated under 9(c) by Contractor due to a breach by Port then Port shall pay Contractor for Work performed prior to the termination date if such Work was performed in accordance with the Contract,
 - iii. If terminated under 9(c) or 9(d) by Port due to a breach by Contractor, then Port shall pay Contractor for Work performed prior to the termination date, provided such Work was

performed in accordance with the Contract, less any setoff to which Port is entitled.

- 10. Payment of Invoices. Unless otherwise provided in Exhibit 2, the payment period shall be one calendar month. Payments are due and payable thirty (30) days from receipt of Contractor's complete invoice or fifteen (15) days after payment is approved by Port, whichever is earlier. Port may withhold 5% of each payment as retainage. Retainage will be paid within 30 days of final completion and acceptance by Port.
- 11. Changes in the Work. Port reserves the right to adjust the scope of the Work by written Change Order. No Change Order will be effective unless approved in writing by Port and signed by Contractor. Agreement on any Change Order shall constitute a final settlement of all matters relating to the change in the Work that is the subject of the Change Order, including but not limited to all direct and indirect costs associated with such change and any and all adjustments to the Contract Sum and the construction schedule. The following terms apply to any Change Order:
 - a. Prices. Every price stated in a Change Order must be inclusive of all costs to complete the work associated with that price.
 - b. Costs. The prices in a Change Order may consist only of the following costs as they relate to the Work required by the Change Order:
 - i. <u>Direct Labor Costs</u>. The labor-related costs may include only (1) the hourly wage (without markup or labor burden) and fringe benefits paid by Contractor to employees, based on actual payroll receipts, and (2) direct contributions for employee-related insurance, including industrial and medical insurance and supplemental pension, FICA, FUTA, and state-unemployment-compensation-act payments. Overtime wages may only be included if preapproved in writing by Port.

 Direct Materials Costs. The cost for materials may include only the net cost of materials, including freight costs, after applying all applicable discounts or rebates. No lump-sum costs are allowed unless preapproved in writing by Port.

- Construction Equipment Costs. The cost of equipment published in the Rental Rate Blue Book by Dataquest (the "Blue Book") or the actual rate paid to unrelated third parties for such equipment, as evidenced by rental receipts. If equipment is required for which there is no rental rate published in the Blue Book, the rate must be approved by Port before renting the equipment. If more than one rate may apply, the lower rate must be used. Any equipment-rental rate or quantity exceeding the local fair-market rental value must be approved in writing by Port. The rate for equipment that is necessarily standing by for use may not exceed 50% of the rate established by the foregoing terms, and the rental charge for any equipment may not exceed 75% of the fairmarket purchase price of that equipment. The rental cost may include reasonable mobilization costs only if the equipment is delivered to the worksite solely because of changes in the Work required by a Change Order.
- iv. <u>Insurance or Bond Premium Costs</u>. The cost of a change in an insurance or bond premium may be only the actual cost of any change in Contractor's liability insurance arising directly from changes in the Work required by a Change Order.
- v. <u>Subcontractor Costs</u>. The costs of or incurred by any subcontractor in connection with a Change Order will be calculated in accordance with the foregoing terms of this Section 11b. For avoidance of doubt, no costs under this Section 11b may include fees for consultants, attorneys, or claim preparation.
- vi. <u>Fees</u>. The maximum amount that may be charged for the overhead, profit, or any other cost of Contractor or any subcontractor is as follows, reflected as percentages of the

- amounts that may be charged in accordance with the foregoing under this Section 11b:
- Contractor may charge up to 15% of the cost of any materials that it supplies or work that it properly performs using its own forces.
- Contractor may charge up to 8% of the cost that it directly owes to a subcontractor or supplier for materials supplied or work properly performed by that subcontractor or supplier.
- Each subcontractor may charge up to 12% of the cost of any materials that it supplies or work that it properly performs using its own forces.
- Each subcontractor may charge up to 8% of the cost that it owes for materials supplied or work properly performed by its lower-tiered subcontractors or suppliers.
- 5. The total fee owed to Contractor and all subcontractors, as calculated in accordance with the foregoing, for work performed by all lower-tiered subcontractors that are not in privity of contract with Contractor or a subcontractor may not exceed 25% of the total amount owed to all lower-tiered subcontractors. Additionally, Port will not owe any fee related to the direct settlement of any claim between Contractor and any subcontractor.

If a change in the Work involves both additive and deductive items, the fees charged in accordance with this section will be calculated based on, and then added to, the net difference of the items. If the net difference is negative, no fee will be added to the negative figure. The parties acknowledge that the fees listed in this section are substantially greater than the fees and overhead normally included in determining the Contract Sum bid; that these higher percentages are a sufficient amount to compensate Contractor for all effects of changes in the Work; and that the resulting overcompensation of Contractor for these changes compensates Contractor for all changes in the Work for which Contractor believes that the percentage is otherwise insufficient

 12. Inspection and Acceptance of Work. Port shall inspect Contractor's Work and advise Contractor of any deficiencies, or if there are none, that the Work has been accepted. Contractor shall perform all additional Work necessary to correct any deficiencies without undue delay and without additional cost to Port.
 - 13. Right to Withhold Payments. Port shall have the right to withhold from payments due Contractor such sums as necessary, in Port's sole opinion, to protect Port against any loss, damage, or claim that may result from Contractor's performance or failure to perform under this Contract or the failure of Contractor to make proper payment to any suppliers or subcontractors.
 - 14. Knowledge of Site Conditions. Contractor shall, as a condition precedent to commencement of the Work (a) become familiar with the Project site and review all analyses, studies, and test data available to Contractor concerning the conditions of the Project site, (b) inspect the location of the Work and satisfy itself as to the condition thereof, including all structural, surface, and observed subsurface conditions, and (c) determine (i) that the Contract Sum is just and reasonable compensation for all the Work, including all foreseen and foreseeable construction risks, hazards, and difficulties in connection therewith, (ii) that the Contract Time is adequate for the performance of the Work, and (iii) that the Work shall not result in any lateral or vertical movement of any adjacent structure. Contractor will notify Port in writing in advance of commencement of the Work if it determines that it cannot satisfy these conditions.
 - 15. <u>Special Care</u>. Contractor shall exercise special care in executing subsurface work in proximity of known subsurface utilities, improvements, and easements.

16. Port's Right to Stop the Work.

- a. If Contractor fails to correct Work that is not in accordance with the requirements of the Contract Documents or fails to carry out Work in accordance with the Contract Documents, Port may issue a written order to Contractor to stop the Work, or any portion thereof, until the cause for such order has been eliminated.
- b. If suspension of the Work is warranted by reason of unforeseen conditions that may adversely affect the quality of the Work if such Work were continued, Port may suspend the Work by giving written notice to Contractor. In such event, the Contract Time shall be adjusted accordingly, and the Contract Sum shall be adjusted to the extent, if any, that additional costs are incurred by reason of such suspension.
- c. Notwithstanding any other provision, Port's authorized representative may, in his or her complete discretion, stop all of the Work, or any portion of the Work, if the Work creates a safety hazard or if a life/safety threat exists to the facility or its occupants. Any cost to correct deficiencies in Contractor's Work will be borne solely by Contractor.
- 17. Performance of the Work. Contractor shall supervise, coordinate, and perform the Work in accordance with the Contract Documents in a professional, safe, and workmanlike manner and in accordance with all laws, codes, and professional standards applicable to the industries and trades involved, including without limitation compliance with all applicable federal, state, and local building codes, Port's construction and life safety policies and procedures, certification requirements applicable to the Work, and other policies or standards incorporated or referenced in the Contract Documents. Unless otherwise noted or directed, Contractor will perform all Work in accordance with product manufacturers' recommendations or directions for best results. No preparatory step or installation procedure may be omitted unless specifically authorized by the Contract Documents or at the direction of Owner's Design Professional or Port's Representative. Conflicts between manufacturers' directions shall be resolved by Owner's Design Professional or Port's Representative.
- 18. <u>Remedies</u>. In the event of breach of this Contract, the parties shall have the following remedies:
 - a. If terminated under 9(c) by Port due to a breach by Contractor, Port may complete the Work either itself, by agreement with another Contractor, or by a combination thereof. If the cost of completing the Work exceeds the remaining unpaid balance of the total compensation provided under this Contract, then Contractor shall pay to Port the amount of the reasonable excess.
 - b. In addition to the remedies in Sections 9 and 13 for a breach by Contractor, Port also shall be entitled to any other equitable and legal remedies that are available.
 - c. If Port breaches this Contract, Contractor's remedy shall be limited to termination of the Contract and receipt of Contract payments for which Contractor has completed the Work.

19. Claims.

- a. <u>Time Limits on Claims</u>: Claims by either party must be made within 10 days after occurrence of the event giving rise to such Claim or within 10 days after the claimant first recognizes the condition giving rise to the Claim, whichever is later. Claims must be made in writing to the other party, and must identify the known bases for each Claim and the nature and amount of the relief sought. Failure to timely file a written claim constitutes a waiver of the claim.
- b. <u>Continuing Contract Performance</u>: Pending final resolution of a Claim except as otherwise agreed in writing, Contractor shall proceed diligently with performance of the Contract and Port shall continue to make payments in accordance with the Contract Documents.
- c. <u>Claims for Additional Costs</u>: If Contractor wishes to make a Claim for an increase in the Contract Sum, written notice as provided herein shall be given before proceeding to execute the

- Work. Prior notice is not required for Claims relating to an emergency endangering life or property. In an emergency affecting the safety of persons or property, Contractor shall act to prevent threatened damage, injury, or loss and shall immediately notify Port. The prices in any Claim must conform to the terms of Section 11.
- d. <u>Claims for Additional Time</u>: If Contractor wishes to make a Claim for an increase in the Contract Time, written notice as provided herein shall be given. Contractor's Claim shall include an estimate of cost and of probable effect of delay on progress of the Work. In the case of a continuing delay, only one Claim is necessary.
- 20. Compliance With Applicable Law. Contractor shall comply with all federal, state, and local laws applicable to the Work under this Contract, and all regulations and administrative rules established pursuant to those laws, including without limitation the following:
 - a. ORS 279A.110: Contractor certifies that Contractor has not discriminated and will not discriminate against a subcontractor in awarding a subcontract because the subcontractor is a disadvantaged business enterprise, a minority-owned business, a women-owned business, a business that is owned by a service-disabled veteran, or an emerging small business that is certified under ORS 200.055.
 - a. <u>ORS 279C.380</u>: If the contract price is \$100,000 or more, unless exempted by Port in writing pursuant to Port's Public Contracting Rules, prior to starting Work under this Contract, Contractor shall execute and deliver to Port a good and sufficient performance bond, in a form acceptable to Port, in a sum equal to 100% of the Contract Price for the faithful performance of the Contract, and shall execute and deliver to Port a good and sufficient payment bond, in a form acceptable to Port, in a sum equal to 100% of the Contract Price solely for the protection of claimants under ORS 279C.600.
 - b. <u>ORS 279C.505</u>: Contractor shall make payment promptly, as due, to all persons supplying to such Contractor labor or material for the prosecution of the Work provided for in such Contract; pay all contributions or amounts due the Industrial Accident Fund from such Contractor or subcontractor incurred in the performance of the Contract; not permit any lien or claim to be filed or prosecuted against the state, county, school, municipality, municipal corporation or subdivision thereof, on account of any labor or material furnished; and pay to the Department of Revenue all sums withheld from employees pursuant to ORS 316.167. Contractor shall further demonstrate that an employee drug-testing program is in place.
 - c. <u>ORS 279C.510</u>: If this Contract includes demolition work, Contractor shall salvage or recycle construction and demolition debris, if feasible and cost-effective. If this Contract includes lawn or landscape maintenance, Contractor shall compost or mulch yard waste material at an approved site, if feasible and costeffective.
 - d. ORS 279C.515: If Contractor fails, neglects, or refuses to make prompt payment of any claim for labor or services furnished to Contractor or a subcontractor by any person in connection with this Contract as such claim becomes due, Port may pay such claim to the person furnishing the labor or services and charge the amount of the payment against funds due or to become due Contractor by reason of this Contract. The payment of a claim in the manner authorized in this section shall not relieve Contractor or Contractor's surety from any obligation with respect to any unpaid claims.
 - Unless the payment is subject to a good-faith dispute as defined in ORS 279C.580, if Contractor or any first-tier subcontractor fails to pay any claim for materials or labor furnished under this Contract within 30 days after being paid by Port, interest shall be due on such claim as specified in ORS 279C.515(2) at the end of the 10-

day period that payment is due under ORS 279C.580(4). A person with any such unpaid claim may file a complaint with the Construction Contractor's Board unless the complaint is subject to a good-faith dispute as defined in ORS 279C.580.

e. ORS 279C.520:

- i. Contractor shall not employ any person for more than 10 hours in any one day, or 40 hours in any one week, except in cases of necessity, emergency, or where the public policy absolutely requires it, and in such cases, except in cases of contracts for personal services as defined in ORS 279A.055, the laborer shall be paid at least time and a half pay:
 - For all overtime in excess of eight hours a day or 40 hours in any one week when the work week is five consecutive days, Monday through Friday; and
 - For all overtime in excess of 10 hours a day or 40 hours in any one week when the work week is four consecutive days, Monday through Friday; and
 - For work performed on Saturday and on any legal holiday specified in any applicable collective bargaining agreement or ORS 279C.540.
 - 4. The requirement to pay at least time and a half for all overtime worked in excess of 40 hours in any one week shall not apply to individuals who are excluded under ORS 653.010 to 653.261 or under 29 U.S.C. Section 201 to 209 from receiving overtime.
- ii. Contractor shall comply with ORS 652.220 (addressing the prohibition of discriminatory wage rates based on sex and of employer discrimination against an employee who is a complainant). Compliance is a material element of this Contract. Failure to comply is a breach that entitles Port to terminate this Contract for cause.
- Contractor shall not prohibit any of Contractor's employees from discussing the employee's wage, salary, benefits, or other compensation with another employee or another person, and Contractor shall not retaliate against an employee who does so.
- iv. Contractor shall and shall require its subcontractors to give notice to their employees who work under this Contract in writing, either at the time of hire or before commencement of Work on the Contract, or by posting a notice in a location frequented by employees, of the number of hours per day and days per week that the employees may be required to work.
- f. ORS 279C.525: State law requires that solicitation documents for a public improvement contract make specific reference to federal, state, and local agencies that have enacted ordinances, rules, or regulations dealing with the prevention of environmental pollution or the preservation of natural resources that may affect the performance of this Contract. These agencies include, but are not limited to:
 - i. Federal Agencies: Department of Agriculture, Forest Service, Soil and Water Conservation Service, Coast Guard, Department of Defense, Army Corps of Engineers, Department of Emergency, Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, Environmental Protection Agency, Department of Health and Human Services, Department of Housing and Urban Development, Solar Energy and Energy Conservation Bank, Department of Interior, Bureau of Land Management, Bureau of Indian Affairs, Bureau of Mines, Bureau of Reclamation, Geological Survey, Minerals Management Service, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Department of Labor, Mine Safety and Health Administration, Occupation Safety and Health Administration, Department of Transportation, Federal Highway Administration, Water Resources Council.
 - State Agencies: Department of Administrative Services, Department of Agriculture, Soil and Water Conservation Commission, Columbia River Gorge Commission, Department

- of Energy, Department of Environmental Quality, Department of Fish and Wildlife, Department of Forestry, Department of Geology and Mineral Industries, Department of Human Resources, Department of Consumer and Business Services, Land Conservation and Development Commission, Department of Parks and Recreation, Division of State Lands, Department of Water Resources.
- iii. Local Agencies: City councils, county courts, county boards of commissioners, metropolitan service Port councils, design commissions, historic preservation commissions, planning commissions, development review commissions, special Port boards of directors, and other special Ports and special governmental agencies such as Tri-Met, urban renewal agencies, and port Ports.
- iv. Tribal Governments.
- g. <u>ORS 279C.530</u>: Contractor shall promptly, as due, make payments to any person, copartnership, association, or corporation furnishing medical, surgical, and hospital care or other needed care and attention, incident to sickness or injury, to the employees of such Contractor, of all sums that Contractor agrees to pay for such services and all moneys and sums that Contractor collected or deducted from the wages of employees pursuant to any law, contract, or agreement for the purpose of providing or paying for such service.

To the extent any of Contractor's employees are covered by the Oregon employment laws, Contractor, its subcontractors, if any, and all employers working under this Contract are subject employers under the Oregon Workers' Compensation Law and shall comply with ORS 656.017, which requires them to provide workers' compensation coverage for all their subject workers. See Contractor Exemption Certification — Exhibit 4 if you believe you may be exempt from this requirement.

- h. <u>ORS 279C.545</u>: Workers employed by Contractor shall be foreclosed from the right to collect for any overtime under this Contract unless a claim for payment is filed with Contractor within 90 days from the completion of the Contract, providing Contractor has:
 - Caused a circular clearly printed in blackface pica type and containing a copy of this section to be posted in a prominent place alongside the door of the timekeeper's office or in a similar place that is readily available and freely visible to any or all workers employed on the work, and

 Maintained such circular continuously posted from the inception to the completion of the Contract on which workers are or have been employed.

- i. ORS 279C.580(3): Contractor shall include in each subcontract for property or services with a first-tier subcontractor a clause that obligates Contractor to pay the first-tier subcontractor for satisfactory performance under its subcontract within 10 days out of such amounts as are paid to Contractor by Port. Contractor shall also include in each subcontract a clause that states that if Contractor fails to pay any claim for materials or labor furnished under this Contract within 30 days after being paid by Port, interest shall be due on such claim as specified in ORS 279C.515(2) at the end of the 10-day period that payment is due under ORS 279C.580(3). Contractor shall require each first-tier subcontractor to include a payment clause and interest clause conforming to the requirements of ORS 279C.580 in each of its subcontracts, and to require each of its subcontractors to include a similar clause in each contract with a lower-tiered subcontractor or supplier.
- j. ORS 279C.800 to 279C.870:
 - i. This Contract is X // is not subject to payment of prevailing wages under ORS 279C.800 to 279C.870. Each worker that Contractor, any subcontractor, or other person who is party to the contract uses in performing all or part of

Such publications can be reviewed electronically at http://www.boli.state.or.us/BOLI/WHD/PWR/pwr_state.shtml and are hereby incorporated as part of the Contract

- ii. This Contract is /is not X also subject to payment of prevailing wages under the federal Davis-Bacon Act (40 U.S.C. 3141 et seq.). Notwithstanding subsection j(i) of this section, if this Contract is subject to payment of prevailing wages under the Davis-Bacon Act, Contractor and any subcontractors must pay the higher of the federal prevailing wage rate or the state prevailing wage. The latest state prevailing wages can be reviewed as set forth in subsection j(i) of this section. The latest federal prevailing wage rates can be reviewed electronically at http://www.wdol.gov/Index.aspx (Search for Oregon, Multnomah County, Building Construction Type) and are hereby incorporated by reference as part of the Contract Documents. Contractors shall follow all prevailing wage rules including posting the Davis Bacon Poster at the worksite and submitting certified payroll records. The poster is available at http://www.dol.gov/whd/regs/compliance/posters/fedprojc.pdf. The payroll form is at
- http://www.dol.gov/whd/forms/wh347instr.htm.

 iii. Port shall pay a fee to the Commissioner of the Oregon Bureau of Labor and Industries as provided in ORS 279C.825. The fee shall be paid to the Commissioner under the administrative
- rule of the Commissioner.

 iv. Contractor and any subcontractors shall post the prevailing wage rates in a conspicuous and accessible place in or about the Project.
- k. <u>ORS 279C.836</u>: If this Contract is subject to payment of prevailing wages under ORS 279C.800 to 279C.870, Contractor shall:
 - File a public works bond with the Construction Contractors Board pursuant to ORS 279C.836 before starting Work on the Project, unless exempt under ORS 279C.836(2), (7), or (8).
 - Include in every subcontract a provision requiring the subcontractor to file a public works bond with the Construction Contractors Board pursuant to ORS 279C.836 before starting work on the project, unless exempt under ORS 279C.836(2), (7), or (8).
- ORS 279C.845: If this Contract is subject to payment of prevailing wages under ORS 279C.800 to 279C.870:

Contractor or Contractor's surety and every subcontractor or subcontractor's surety shall file with Port a certified statement on a form provided by BOLI certifying the hourly rate of wage paid each worker employed by Contractor or subcontractor on the Work and that no such worker has been paid less than the prevailing rate of wage or wage specified under the Contract.
 - Notwithstanding ORS 279C.555 or 279C570(7), Port shall retain 25% of all amounts earned by Contractor until Contractor has filed the certified statements as required by ORS 279C.845. In addition, Contractor shall retain 25% of any amount earned by a first-tier subcontractor until such

- subcontractor has filed the certified statements with Port. Port and/or Contractor shall pay any such retained amounts within 14 days after such certified statements are filed.
- m. ORS 468A.710: If this Contract requires asbestos abatement, Contractor or subcontractor must possess an asbestos abatement license as required by ORS 468A.700 et seq.
- n. ORS 671.560, 701.055: If Contractor is performing work as a landscape contractor as defined in ORS 671.520(2), Contractor must have a current, valid landscape contractor's license issued under ORS 671.560. If Contractor is performing work as a construction contractor as defined in ORS 701.005(2), Contractor must have a current, valid construction contractor's license issued under ORS 701.701.055. Contractor shall maintain in effect all licenses, permits, and certifications required for the performance of the Work. Contractor shall notify Port immediately if any license, permit, or certification required for performance of this Contract shall cease to be in effect for any reason.
- 21. Quality of Goods and Services. Unless otherwise specified, all materials shall be new and both workmanship and materials shall be of the highest quality. All workers and subcontractors shall be skilled in their trade.
- 22. Delay. Contractor shall furnish sufficient staffing, materials, and equipment and work such hours, including night shifts, overtime, and weekend and holiday work, as may be necessary to insure the production of the Work in accordance with the date of Substantial Completion and the approved construction schedule. If Contractor fails to perform in a timely manner in accordance with the Contract Documents and, through the fault of Contractor or any subcontractor, or by reason of any delay that is within Contractor's reasonable control, fails to meet the approved construction schedule, then Contractor shall take such steps as may be necessary to immediately improve its progress by increasing the number of workers, shifts, overtime operations, or days of work, all without additional cost to Port. Port will not be liable for any damages or extra costs resulting from any delay in Contractor's work not caused by Port, nor will Port be obligated to grant any extension of the Contract Time for any delay in Contractor's work not caused by Port. All such damages or costs shall be paid by Contractor.
- 23. <u>Errors</u>. Contractor shall perform such additional work as may be necessary to correct errors in the Work required under this Contract without undue delay and without additional cost.
- 24. Access to Records. Contractor agrees that Port and its authorized representatives shall have access to the books, documents, papers, and records of Contractor that are directly pertinent to the specific Contract for the purpose of making audit, examination, excerpts, and transcripts.
- 25. Maintenance of Records. Contractor shall maintain all fiscal records directly relating to this Contract in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. In addition, Contractor shall maintain any other records pertinent to this Contract in such a manner as to clearly document Contractor's performance. Contractor acknowledges and agrees that Port's duly authorized representatives shall have access to such fiscal records and other books, documents, papers, plans, and writings of Contractor that are pertinent to this Contract to perform examinations and audits and make excerpts and transcripts. Contractor shall retain and keep accessible all such fiscal records, books, documents, papers, plans, and writings for a minimum of three (3) years, or such longer period as may be required by applicable law, following final payment and termination of this Contract or until the conclusion of any audit, controversy, or litigation arising out of or related to this Contract, whichever date is later.
- 26. Ownership of Work. All work products created by Contractor as part of Contractor's performance of this Contract, including background data, documentation, and staff work that are preliminary to final reports, shall be the exclusive property of Port. If any such work products contain intellectual property of Contractor that is or

could be protected by federal copyright, patent, or trademark laws, Contractor hereby grants Port a perpetual, royalty-free, fully paid-up, non-exclusive, and irrevocable license to copy, reproduce, deliver, publish, perform, dispose of, use, re-use, in whole or in part, and to authorize others to do so, all such work products. Port shall have no rights in any pre-existing work product of Contractor provided to Port by Contractor in the performance of this Contract except to copy, use, and re-use any such work product for Port use only. If this Contract is terminated by either party or by default, Port, in addition to any other rights provided by this Contract, may require Contractor to transfer and deliver such partially completed work products, reports, or other documentation that Contractor has specifically developed or specifically acquired for the performance of this Contract.

27. Warranty.

- a. Contractor warrants to Port and Owner's Design Professional that materials and equipment furnished under the Contract will be of good quality and new unless otherwise required or permitted by the Contract Documents, that the Work will be free from defects not inherent in the quality required or permitted, and that the Work will conform to the requirements of the Contract Documents. Work not conforming to these requirements, including substitutions not properly approved and authorized, may be considered defective. Contractor's warranty excludes remedy for damage or defect caused by abuse, modifications not executed by Contractor, improper or insufficient maintenance, improper operation, or normal wear and tear and normal usage. If required by Owner's Design Professional or Port, Contractor shall furnish satisfactory evidence as to the kind and quality of materials and equipment.
- b. Port In addition to Contractor's other obligations under this contract, including but not limited to the Section 27.a above, Contractor shall, for a period of one (1) year after Substantial Completion (the "Correction Period"), correct work that is defective or that does not otherwise conform to the requirements of the Contract Documents.
- c. If, during the Correction Period and after 10 days' notice,
 Contractor fails to proceed to cure any defective or
 nonconforming Work, Port may have the defects corrected and
 Contractor and its surety shall be liable for all expenses incurred.
 In case of an emergency where, in the opinion of Port or Owner's
 Design Professional, delay would cause serious loss or damage,
 corrective work may be undertaken without advance notice to
 Contractor, but Contractor and its surety shall remain liable for all
 expenses incurred. The remedies stated in this subsection are not
 exclusive, but are cumulative of any other remedies Port may
- d. Contractor shall assign all manufacturers' warranties to Port and all guarantees and warranties of goods supplied under this Contract shall be deemed to run to the benefit of Port. Contractor shall provide Port with all manufacturers' warranty documentation and operations and maintenance manuals not later than the date of final acceptance of the Work by Port.
- 28. Indemnification. Contractor shall defend, indemnify, and hold the Port, its officers, agents and employees (the "Indemnified Parties"), harmless against all liability, claims, loss, costs, or expenses, including attorney's fees, based upon or arising out of damage or injury (including death) to persons or property caused by any act or omission of an act arising from Contractor's performance of the Work. In claims against any person or entity indemnified under this Section by an employee of Contractor, a subcontractor, anyone directly or indirectly employed by them or anyone for whose acts they may be liable, the indemnification obligation this Section shall not be limited by a limitation on amount or type of damages, compensation, or benefits payable by or for Contractor or a subcontractor under workers' compensation acts, disability benefit acts, or other employee benefit acts. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Section

- 28, Contractor is not required to indemnify the Indemnified Parties for, from, and against liability for damage arising out of death or bodily injury to persons or damage to property caused in whole or in part by the negligence or willful misconduct of the Indemnified Parties, but Contractor is required to indemnify the Indemnified Parties for, from, and against liability for damage arising out of death or bodily injury to persons or damage to property to the extent that the death or bodily injury to persons or damage to property arises out of the fault of Contractor, or the fault of Contractor's agents, representatives, or subcontractors.
- 29. Insurance. Unless otherwise provided below, Contractor shall at all times maintain in force at Contractor's expense, the following insurance coverage:
 - a. Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability: As required by ORS 656.017, subject employers shall provide workers' compensation coverage in accordance with ORS Chapter 656 for all subject workers. Contractor and all subcontractors of Contractor with one or more employees shall have this insurance unless exempt under ORS 656.027. Contractor shall purchase and maintain employer's liability insurance of at least \$500,000 per accident.
 - b. Commercial General Liability: Contractor shall purchase and maintain CGL insurance with occurrence-based coverage on ISO Form CG 0001 (12/04 or later) or an equivalent form approved in advance by Port. The CGL insurance shall include all major coverage categories including bodily injury, property damage, and completed operations coverage maintained for at least six years following final payment. The CGL insurance will also include the following: (1) separation of insured; (2) incidental medical malpractice; and (3) personal injury with employment exclusion deleted. Contractor shall maintain CGL insurance coverage of at least \$1,000,000 for each claim, incident, or occurrence, and at least \$2,000,000 annual aggregate coverage.
 - c. Motor Vehicle Liability: Contractor shall purchase and maintain motor vehicle liability insurance with coverage for owned, hired, and non-owned vehicles on ISO form CA 00 01 or an equivalent form approved in advance by Port. The automobile liability insurance shall include pollution liability coverage with vehicle overturn and collision. Contractor shall maintain motor vehicle liability insurance of at least \$1,000,000 for each claim, incident, or occurrence, and at least \$2,000,000 annual aggregate coverage.
 - d. [Reserved.]
 - e. Additional Requirements: All insurance coverage shall be provided by an insurance company having an A.M. Best rating of at least A- and/or licensed to do business in Oregon. Contractor alone is responsible for paying all deductibles and retentions. A cross-liability clause or separation of insureds condition shall be included in all general liability policies required by this Contract. Contractor's coverage shall be primary in the event of loss.
 - f. Certificate of Insurance: Contractor shall furnish to Port a current certificate of insurance for each of the above required coverages prior to conducting Work under this Contract. Additional insured endorsements must be written on ISO Form CG 2010 (11/85) or CG 2037 (07/04) together with CG 2033 (07/04), or their equivalent. Each certificate must provide that there shall be no cancellation, termination, material change, or reduction of limits of the insurance coverage without 30 days' prior written notice from Contractor or its insurer to Port. Each certificate shall also state the relevant deductible or retention level. For commercial general liability and automobile liability coverage, the certificate shall also provide that Port, its agents, officers, and employees are additional insureds with respect to Contractor's services provided under this Contract. If requested by Port, Contractor shall also provide complete copies of insurance policies to Port.
- 30. Notice of Injury or Damage to Person or Property. If any person suffers physical injury or property damage arising from the Work

- regardless of the cause, Contractor shall give notice of such injury or damage, whether or not insured, immediately to Port's authorized representative and Contractor's authorized representative. The notice shall provide sufficient detail to enable Port and any other party affected to investigate the matter.
- 31. Waiver. Waiver of any default under this Contract by Port shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any subsequent default or a modification of the provisions of this Contract.
- 32. <u>Litigation</u>. Any Claim arising out of or related to the Contract, except those waived as provided for in Section 19, shall be resolved by litigation in the Circuit Court of Curry County or the U.S. District Court for the District of Oregon in Medford, Oregon.
- 33. Governing Law. The provisions of this Contract shall be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Oregon as they exist at the time of execution of this Contract or any subsequent amendment.
- 34. Severability. If any term or provision of this Contract is declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be illegal or in conflict with any law, the validity of the remaining terms and provisions shall not be affected, and the rights and obligations of the parties shall be construed and enforced as if the Contract did not contain the particular term or provision held invalid.
- 35. Merger Clause. This Contract and the attached exhibits constitute the entire agreement between the parties. All understandings and agreements between the parties and representations by either party concerning this Contract are contained in this Contract. No waiver, consent, modification, or change in the terms of this Contract shall

- bind either party unless in writing signed by both parties. Any written waiver, consent, modification, or change shall be effective only in the specific instance and for the specific purpose given.
- 36. Anti-discrimination Clause. Contractor must comply with all applicable requirements of federal and state civil rights law and rehabilitation statutes and shall not discriminate based on race, religion, color, sex, sexual orientation, marital status, familial status, national origin, age, mental or physical disability, or political affiliation in programs, activities, services, benefits, or employment.
- 37. Attorney Fees. If a suit or action is filed to enforce any of the terms of this Contract, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover from the other party, in addition to costs and disbursements provided by statute, any sum that a court, including any appellate court, may adjudge reasonable as attorney fees. In the event the prevailing party is represented by "in-house" counsel, the prevailing party shall nevertheless be entitled to recover reasonable attorney fees based on the reasonable time incurred.
- 38. Rule of Construction. The rule of construction that a contract is construed against the drafter shall not apply to any dispute over the interpretation of application of the Contract.
- 39. Removal of Debris. Contractor shall remove all trash and debris from the site for disposal. Contractor shall clean the work area and remove all trash, debris, and tools at least daily prior to leaving the job site and as needed to maintain a safe work area.

OVERVIEW

 Jack Akin/EMC Engineers/Scientists provided his final recommendations including a second opinion from a structural engineer on the condition of the existing boat yard warehouse. Jack's report and structural engineer recommendation are attached for your review and discussion on the plan to move forward.

There are a few options the Port could decide:

- Continue renting the space as-is and follow EMC recommendations.
- Condemn the building and remove all tenants. Leave building vacant until funding is available to repair or replace.
- Immediately seek funding for repairs and bring the building up to current building codes.
- Immediately seek funding for a new boat yard building and demo existing building.
- Please note: If FEMA approves the funding for the Kite Field mitigation work for a RV
 Park expansion, FEMA will not provide the funding for the utilities or additional
 amenities. If the Port decides to install the utilities and additional amenities, another loan
 may need to be acquired to complete the project.

As you know I have completed the inspection and report RE the Boatyard Warehouse.

My observations and recommendations are not very positive. The building is in unsatisfactory condition, and actions as recommended should be taken, or, alternatively, you may decide to accept Mr. Mockridge's recommendation, and my implied recommendation to demolish the building. I don't know if the function of that Warehouse is crucial to the Port. If so, then you may decide to go with Brian's recommendation to replace the Warehouse with a pre-fab steel structure.

And so my opinion concurs with in that expressed by Brian Mockridge, PE, a structural engineer specializing in wooden structures. His opinion from an off-site view of photos provided to him were as follows:

"Good afternoon Jack,

I don't have much doubt that the cost to repair and upgrade the building would exceed the cost of the existing materials that you are saving.

There are a couple of things to consider.

- 1) Many of the structural elements seem to have reached the end of their useful life span,
- 2) The structure was likely built before/without any structural design and many of the structural components will fail current applied load requirements(Especially ocean wind design pressures).

I would recommend demolishing the structure and replacing it with a pre-fabricated steel structure.

Erik Oberbeck, Engineering Geologist, as you both know, was contracted to review the Boatyard Warehouse, the Hallmark Commercial Receiving Dock and the failing Boardwalk section adjacent and south of the northmost gangway access to Basin 1. His comments are below (that pertaining to the Warehouse is emboldened). Erik's comments were RE subsurface liquefaction, and, as you can see, he had nothing to say about the structure itself.

"Jack, per our conversation, I would recommend that as part of the engineering on the new warehouse (Site 1) that we do 2 shallow borings to determine depth to groundwater and whether the soils under the building are liquefiable. We can also do standard penetration tests to determine the

consistency of the soils at depth and which will augment your penetrometer data. If liquefiable soils are encountered, we can come up with a plan to density them in situ.

As discussed, I would recommend that we do a proof roll on the Hallmark load area (Site 2) using a comparably loaded rubber-tired vehicle. We can monitor and observe settlement and deflection of the driving surface and observe movement, if any, of the wood support piles. We can also either install tilt plates which we can use to monitor movement of the structure using a portable tiltmeter or set some permanent survey points which can be monitored for elevation changes.

It is my opinion that your assessment regarding the walkway (Site 3) is correct and that a failure surface has developed at the contact of the side cast fill and the native alluvium. This is indicated by separation of the walkway from the roadbed and loading and observed rotation at the toe of the slope. As we discussed, it appears that movement was rotational and that the support piles which are attached to the structure moved with the upper part of the slope. I would suggest we bore 2 or 3 shallow borings into the roadbed to determine where and what our bearing layer is.

I will file this until I hear from you. I dictated part of it using my word program- thanks for the tip, Eric

Summary

This 5/3/22 inspection of the Boatyard Warehouse has produced the following findings:

- 1. Deteriorating column and lateral support has rendered the two buildings comprising the Boatyard Warehouse unsafe without routine and frequent monitoring. Employees work in the building every day. Temporary columns placed to support failing structure do not provide resistance against lateral movement. As defined in IBC 3402.1, the Boatyard Warehouse has suffered Substantial Structural Damage, both to lateral and vertical load-bearing elements of the building.
- 2. The electrical system in the Boatyard Warehouse presents both hazardous energy and fire hazards. A certified electrical inspection should be required.
- Concerns exist regarding Accessibility, that is; entry/exit paths that are blocked.
- 4. Building sheathing is in disrepair. Water damage is and has been occurring throughout the building, and has degraded structural elements.
- 5. It is estimated that the adequate repair/renovation of the described hazards for occupational use would not be cost-effective. The approximate remodeling cost is likely to be 50-100 percent of building replacement value. For example, in order to repair damaged roof support columns and beams (see Photos 10-1 and 10-2), sheathing removal, jacking of nearby members, placing a splice or flush beams and columns, reconstruction of framing, etc. would be required. Deterioration via water damage of hidden structural members near beam and rafter supports are likely to exist.

Recommendations

- 1. Implement a bi-weekly visual inspection of temporary columns. Look and annotate any settling or movement of structural supports, overhead beams.
- 2. Conduct an electrical inspection of all electrical outlets, wiring, etc.
- 3. Assess fire protection (fire extinguishers, potential ignition sources).
- 4. Conduct a structural assessment and construct a structural repair plan, including existing and potential water damage, anchoring of walls, adequate protection against wind loading.
- 5. Stop all sources of water damage (roof and siding sheathing).
- 6. Assure functionality of man and/or bay doors. At least one, and preferably two, means of entry/exit must remain functional and unblocked at all times for each occupancy.

Introduction

On Tuesday, May 3, Jack Akin of EMC-Engineers/Scientists, LLC (EMC) met with Gary Dehlinger (Port Manager) & Travis Webster (Port Harbormaster) to inspect the two warehouse buildings located in the Boatyard.

Observations

Observations noted during 5/03 inspection are provided below, citing photos numbered 1 through 24. For the purposes of this report the two adjacent warehouse buildings will be considered to comprise the Boatyard Warehouse.

Photo 1 shows what could be considered the east front of the Warehouse, showing the general construction of the buildings to be wood frame atop concrete slab, with wood columns supporting beams and rafters, covered by metal sheeting. Photo 2 shows that the columns in the section of the building shown in Photo 1 are placed in soil, are not treated and are absorbing water. Photo 3 shows the same column lapped atop with large joist and rafter, fixed by hardware to support roof sheathing. Photo 4 shows a section of peeled sheathing, which is present at several locations on building sidings and roof. Photo 5 shows the man-door entry into the west-adjacent building with metal sheeting overlapping the cement block stem wall that is laid upon the concrete slab of that building.



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Photo 6 shows double stud wall support placed atop the concrete slab. The studs are treated, but nevertheless are not placed upon a mud sill or bottom plate. Bolting to anchor the building to the concrete is generally not seen in this building.

Photo 7 shows a corroded outside receptacle located on the west side of the Warehouse. Photo 8 is a view of the south side, somewhat center, of the Warehouse, with bay doors open. Photo 9 was taken later in the day when that same opening was blocked by a vehicle. Photos 10 -1 and 10-2 show rotted beams impaled by support columns, pressed by the weight of the roof and wood frame members inside this bay. As shown in Photo 10–2 some temporary supports are placed to prevent the collapse of that section of the building. However it should be noted that the supports provide <u>no lateral</u> support.

Photo 11, Photo 12, Photo 15 and Photo 21–2 all show the general roof support system, characterized by dimensional lumber trusses reinforced with plywood skins, supporting roof and roof ridge boards. Very long, thin joists seem to be used to anchor these trusses against lateral movement. Photo 13 shows typically narrow mud sills between block and jack-column found at several locations in the Warehouse. Photos 14 and 17 show the typical minimal framing, sometimes at open spaces filled with cripple stud wall framing, used for nail bars for the metal sheathing.

A number of roof leaks and flooding are indicated by staining and rotted wood members, dramatically demonstrated by Photo 15, showing a makeshift wooden interior roof placed by Warehouse workers to protect that particular section from dripping water leaking through the above roofing during storms. As seen in Photo 16, doorways are not sealed against the weather. Photos 18 and 20 show adequately framed mezzanine construction, with two stud corners/bottom plates.

However, in these photos, as well as in Photos 21-1, 21-2, 21-3 and 21-4, and elsewhere on other photos in this report, electrical wiring and fixture are certainly not to code, and present a safety hazard (via hazardous energy exposure and fire). Concerns with respect to electrical outlets, wiring, etc. are spoken to below in a bit more detail. Photo 19 shows the construction practice of stud and columns placed atop untreated mud sills/bottom plates, with no observed anchor bolts.

Electrical Service

Upon inspection it was first noticed that 1900 box connections for receptacles, switches, junctions, etc. with industrial covers and MC connectors, MC cables, conduit fittings with supports, EMT conduit tubing and/or RMC conduit, flex, or even Romax conduit were not present at most locations within the building.

Loose extension cord-grade wire to lights and other equipment was seen throughout the building. During this brief inspection violations of NEC code pertaining to receptacle outlet grounding, GFCI protection, wall switch outlet controls, adequate weatherproofing, improper wiring of outlets from switches, etc. are prolific.

It is therefore recommended that an electrical inspection as is put forth in OAR. 918–271–0040 be conducted at the warehouse to inspect the appropriateness of the size, placement, protection and termination of service entrance conductors, service equipment, grounding electrode and grounding electrode conductor, bonding, overcurrent protection branch circuits, feeders and, if applicable any underground installations. The inspection should be performed by a person knowledgeable of the National Electric Code (NEC) and the Oregon Electrical Specialty Code (OESC), as applicable. Perhaps needless to say, even if one to were to forego a formal inspection, it seems obvious that considerable work needs to be done to bring the existing electrical system in the Warehouse to code.































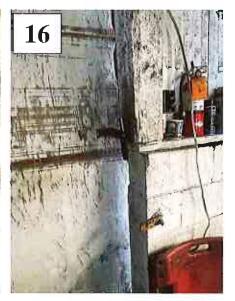












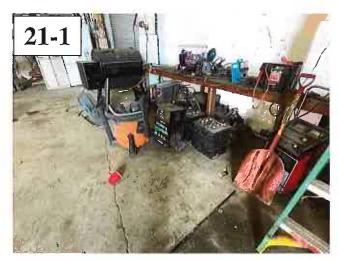














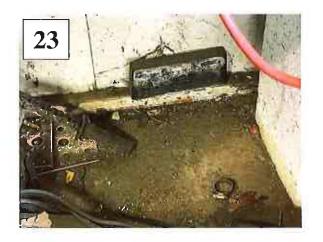

OVERVIEW

 The DEQ Stormwater Pollution Control Plan (SWPCP) second stormwater testing was completed on April 4. This was the second required test for the first six months of 2022.
 Two more tests will be required for the second half of the year.

- The test results continue to show pollution above the benchmark at the gear storage for copper which is under Tier 2 Corrective Action. Tier 2 Corrective Action is under our FEMA plan to install storm drainage system and paving to create parking areas for exempt stormwater area.
- Aluminum benchmark failed at the north gear storage catch basin. This pollution falls under the Tier 1 Reporting.
- Tier 1 Reporting is what the Port Staff can work on improving water quality.
- Tier 2 Reporting is engineered improvements.
